


2024 Winter Storm Emergency Financial Report

The Board of Supervisors has allocated \$19.6 million dollars to community recovery efforts which includes \$16.6 million for emergency temporary lodging and other costs, and \$3 million to feed eligible County Emergency Temporary Lodging participants. The County is redistributing funds allocated to department budgets to support response efforts. Additionally, the County has supported residents with securing over \$25 million in federal aid for the communities impacted by the storms.

- 1. Estimates are a combination of paid invoices and services rendered but not yet invoiced for payment. Projected costs are depicted in the pie charts above, including anticipated unused amount totaling \$2.6 million.
- 2. Includes repairs to County infrastructure like buildings and roads, erosion and flood control, and debris removal in the unincorporated areas. Also includes the County's Local Assistance Center.
- 3. Other costs include County Response and Emergency Operations Center, Emergency Management Consultant (Hagerty Consulting), and Home Repair Fee Waivers.
- 4. Provides financial assistance and direct services to eligible individuals and households who have uninsured or underinsured necessary expenses and serious needs.
- 5. Provides financial assistance after a disaster to cover necessary expenses and serious needs such as transportation, personal property, childcare, and medical and dental expenses.
- 6. Provides residents of homes that were damaged, but are safe to live in, with up to \$300 in one-time financial assistance to help with cleanup.
- 7. Provides a month's worth of benefits which can be used to purchase food at authorized retail stores.
- 8. Provides low-interest disaster loans to help businesses, homeowners, renters, and private nonprofit organizations.
